Easter Egg Hunt and Craft fun! - April 3rd- We met outside and physically distanced. Hunted for eggs and participated in crafts and games.



## A JOYFUL NOISE Handbell Choir - Chris Hogan

Two thousand twenty-one was quite the rollercoaster ride for A Joyful Noise Handbell Choir, as we have braved the pandemic restrictions to continue to bring our music to the Bethel community. The year started out with us being unable to meet and having to rely on previously recorded music. Fortunately, we transitioned in March to a model where we were able to meet at Bethel to pre-record

music for services. This would have been impossible without support from Adam Klopfenstein, Chris Larsen, and Tom Hoegel to whom we are indeed grateful. Thanks to everyone's efforts, we were able to continue playing through most of summer resulting in a rare but lovely handbell version of "America, the

We have had several member changes in 2021. David Kuhlmann decided to ride out the pandemic in Colorado and got a job in Texas later in the year. We will miss David's expert bass playing and his willingness to take on any challenge. Nathaniel Hogan left for college at the end of the summer after many years of playing and filling in missing spots in our choir. On a positive note, Sylvia Halloran joined handbells in September, and has been a great collaborator and a wonderful addition to our community.

A Joyful Noise is now seven players strong, but we can always use more. We would need 10 to 12 players to really make use of our full set of handbells. We invite players with all levels of experience.

#### OFFERING COUNTERS - Liz Tribby

The offering counters started counting the Sunday morning offerings again in September. There were some folks who could not continue, so our numbers are down. We have recruited two new counters

(Mark Evashenk and Mike Coleman – thank you!), but we still need another 2 people at first service and 4-6 people at second service to be fully staffed so we could go back to each team counting once a month with one more team counting on 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays.

## MISSION OUTREACH - MARK EVASHENK

Apart from making and serving breakfast at the *San Jose Family Shelter*, all Mission Outreach activities continued in 2021, although sometimes in a modified fashion. A financial contribution to San Jose Family Shelter was made in lieu of volunteers preparing and serving.

A new outreach in 2021 was to donate duffle bags/or wheelie suitcases for children in the foster care system. These duffle bags will be used by the children when they need to move within the foster care system. In March 2021, Bethel donated close to 50 bags to *Santa Clara County's Social Services Agency* or benefit of *Kinship, Adoptive and Foster Parent Association (KAFPA)*.

The baby layette program to support *Sacred Heart Community Services* was again well received and supported. We collected supplies for 30 bags. The Bethel Quilters Group provided lovely hand-made bags in which the essentials (diapers, wipes, sleepers, onesies, blankets, shampoo, and socks) were placed.

About 60 turkeys were delivered to *The Lord's Pantry* on Sunday November 21.

The Giving Tree sponsored by *Help One Child* was again popular with the Bethel congregation. A total of 80 gifts were donated by Bethel.

And we once again had Advent Giving to support *West Valley Community Services*. Bethel collected and donated barrels of soup, canned goods, pop-top meals, and pasta.

The Bethel congregation showed its love and generosity throughout the year.

#### **QUILTING** - Joann Weberg

Quilting in 2021 was a new adventure for us all. Early in the year we started quilting in the parking lot, if it wasn't too cold or windy. Later, getting back into the Fireside room gave us the opportunity to complete so many more quilts and kits. During the year our Quilting group was able to complete 135 quilts, 150 school kits, 35 personal care kits and 6 fabric kits for Lutheran World Relief to send on to needy people around the world.

We also hosted a Lutheran World Relief Ingathering in October. We had 20 churches, including Bethel, bringing a total of 401 boxes holding 2567 items.

The second northern California location for our Ingathering was at St. James Lutheran Church in Redding. They had an additional 6 churches participating with 59 boxes containing 592 items. Our truck arrived on January 13, 2022 to pick up these boxes. It then went up to Redding to collect their boxes before delivering it all to LWR in St. Paul, MN.



The Quilting group meets on Monday mornings from 9 am until 12 noon with a dedicated group of women. The fellowship that this activity provides is so powerful. Our group of women is very unique and almost all are retired. Bethel's group has been quilting since 1997.

Our biggest need is for new or nearly new sheets that are used for the back of each quilt. We are blessed with donations of cloth for the quilt tops. This material is sorted, washed if needed and cut into various square sizes. Each unique quilt is then designed and sewn. Batting for the quilts is purchased in bulk and is an ongoing expense.

## MT CROSS - Holly Lofgren, Camp Liaison

Mt Cross offered a limited summer camp program in the summer of 2021 and will have more of a regular summer camp program for youth (fully vaxed) in the summer of 2022. Space is limited, however, and those interested are encouraged to sign up asap. Pricing is now tiered according to one's ability to pay. This year's theme is "Boundless God Beyond Measure." The website indicates that campers will be putting school kits together for Lutheran World Relief. Sounds exciting!

Retreats were limited in 2021 (but still accessible) due to the CZU Complex fire and the worldwide pandemic. Look for more expanded opportunities in 2022. Mt Cross is offering day use, challenge course, overnight stays and events (think weddings). Food service has resumed.

The Board of Directors has been revamped in recent times to mirror that of a nonprofit organization and not an ecumenical committee. This is an improvement and should bring a lot more accountability and effectiveness to Mt Cross management.

As in 2021, 2022 is a year welcoming those who would like to put in some sweat equity at the camp. There are regular work weekends, but those interested can schedule yourself or your group for workdays on other dates.

#### SAN JOSE FAMILY SHELTER BREAKFAST MINISTRY - Chris Ford

We did not meet in 2021. The shelter has reopened, but at such a reduced capacity that we might serve only 5 people if we resumed serving breakfast now.

#### CIC MINISTRIES - Chris Christensen

CIC Ministries is continuing to wait on a contract renewal with the county for chaplain services. We are also waiting on the signing of a short-term contract extension. That does mean we have not received payment from the county for October and November. Your prayers are appreciated.

## **EDUCATION & DISCIPLESHIP**

Discipleship focuses on spiritual growth which can take on many different forms. In the past year, Bethel has offered a variety of ways people could engage. Bible studies were held via Zoom, small groups met together following health protocols, and in-person Sunday forums returned this Fall.

## **CARING CONNECTIONS - Joanne Stensaas**

Caring Connection is a prayer ministry that seeks to be action oriented to do God's work. They meet monthly, via Zoom, sharing information about needs in the congregation and other loved ones. This information is gleaned from the prayer lists, Pastor Ben, and care connection team members. ## FINANCE AND HUMAN RESOURCES - FARA BROCK

2021 was a year of change while maintaining Bethel's strong foundation. The office opened again in July when we welcomed Pastor Ben, after being closed since March 2020. In the fall we said goodbye to Patricia Myerholtz after 10 years as Bethel's adult ministry coordinator and to Leslie Steen after 14 years as Bethel's bookkeeper. Fortunately, Mary Deutscher accepted the adult ministry role and took over many of Leslie's office management tasks. It's great to have the office open again after such a long closure due to COVID. To keep everyone safe we are all vaccinated and wearing masks in the office. Visitors are required to also wear masks.

Thanks to the strong support of the congregation during the ongoing constraints of COVID, Bethel finished its fiscal year with total giving only 1% below forecast and expenses 7% below budget. The net income of \$102,000 was \$84,000 above budget due to a grant from Payroll Protection Program since we kept the entire staff employed during the shelter in place period of 2020.

Throughout 2021 the church continued to address the needs of our community by donating to many local and international relief agencies. Bethel gave \$74,000 to the Synod and outside agencies with benevolence and special designated dollars. Top recipients are Lutheran World Relief, Lutheran Disaster Response, Esperanza, Mt. Cross, West Valley Community Services, Habitat for Humanity, Second Harvest Food Bank, and the Synod for churchwide mission support. Bethel also continued to support scholarships for 2 students at MaaSAE Girls school in Tanzania through Bootstrap Operation.

We focused our messages to the congregation in May & June, and virtually collected Faith Promise cards at the end of June. We enjoyed making a voice-over conversation between the spirits of abundance and scarcity while a video of the Santa Cruz boardwalk roller coaster (Big Dipper) took us through highs and lows, twists and turns - a metaphor for the previous year with Covid-19 impacting our lives.

Bethel responded with the majority of Faith Promises collected via the new virtual webform, as well as some traditional mail-in Faith Promises. We applied our congregation as we continued to live out our core value of generosity during another transitional year of online worship that returned to in person worship during the summer.

Planning for our Stewardship campaign started in April, and Faith Promise card follow up with members continued into July, with a final report generated in August. The report showed another solid year of Faith Promises, as nearly 100 Faith Promises were received. We are extremely grateful for the consistent level of giving by our Bethel family during these difficult years of Covid-19 impacting worship and fellowship. This mature level of generosity helps guide Bethel leadership toward responsible budget decisions each year.

This provides a comprehensive and current view of the activities at Bethel for visitors and members alike. It is Bethel's virtual front door to the community. The most popular pages are the home page, the church calendar and the sermons page.

Each week, there were on average 260 user views of Bethel's YouTube channel, <a href="https://www.youtube.com/user/BethelCupertino">https://www.youtube.com/user/BethelCupertino</a>, in 2021. This is mostly worship services, but also includes staff videos.

156 new events were submitted to the Bethel calendar in 2021.

291 updates were applied to the web site in 2021.

Google Analytics reports 40 page views per day to our home page. 41% of these are from mobile and tablet devices. Google Search reports 224 impressions and 9 clicks per day.
